

# County Seats

“County Seats”, as a category, was established in 1935 by Charles N. (Doc) Reed, a pharmacist from Indianapolis, Indiana. He was the one who set the standard for the kind of cover that was needed in this particular category. He decreed that any 20-strike cover that had the name of the city and state on the front of the cover would be the kind of cover you were looking for in this category. It couldn't have more than one town listed, and it should not say “one half mile south”, or “two miles north of...” because then that would put the business outside the county seat city limits; that criteria is still observed today. He was President of RMS in 1958, and to my knowledge no one knows what happened to his collection.

The total number of county seats fluctuates from time to time, but now it appears from the listings I have that there are 3,068 Counties and 3,076 County Seats. It's not an easy category--some are next to impossible to get. Try to find one from Charles City, Virginia, or Mentone, Texas. There are quite a few more like this, and to find a cover from those towns that's not an Americana and not a Kurt Frier salesman cover, to date, has been impossible.

Ed Perkins' “Americana” are excluded by most collectors with the hope of eventually replacing them. The reason for this is that a good number of them were never ordered by the advertiser in that county seat, or in fact paid for by Perkins before their distribution, or were never even known to exist by the advertiser until they were shown the cover. I can personally say that I visited the Americana advertiser from Huntsville, Tennessee; Knoxville, Georgia; and Charles City, Virginia, and can tell you all for a fact that either they were aware of the cover, but did not buy them from Perkins or never knew that the cover existed until I showed it to them. Because of this kind of thing happening, most county seat collectors do not accept an Americana as an authentic cover from a county seat.

Another example is Kurt Frier, a Superior Match Company salesman from Brownsville, Texas. He was a very pleasant and nice collector to know and sold a lot of his customers' covers to collectors back in the 1960's. However, he issued covers from such difficult county seats in Texas as: San Diego, Mentone, Sarita,

Loving, and Montague--none of which are authentic covers. Yet, he put his name on them with these cities listed on the covers. Yet, he never lived in any of those towns; he never had an office there; and, they were only issued so that the collectors could have something from that town to complete their county-seat collections. That information comes from the individual, himself.

Most states have the same number of counties as there are county seats. However, there are a number of exceptions that deserve mention here. Alaska does not have the county seat form of government. It uses burroughs or judicial districts, and currently we are aware of some 23 burroughs and 4 judicial districts.

Arkansas and Mississippi have several counties that have double county seats--in other words--they have two county seats in one county. Having visited some of those county seats, I've been told that the reason for that was that when the counties were originally laid out, there was some kind of river running through the county, and it was felt that land on each side of the river should have a county seat. To date, that system still exists in both states.

Connecticut abolished the county seat form of government in 1964. They have commissioner's offices which run the "county-type" form of government in that state.

Louisiana does not have any counties. Louisiana calls them "parishes" and "parish seats" and not counties and county seats.

South Dakota is unique in that there are two counties, namely Shannon and Todd, which have no county seat at all. Those counties are unorganized and consist mostly of Indian reservation territory, and that county government is run by an adjoining county. In a number of cases, some county seats have been changed for many different reasons. A lot of collectors save the county seats that were in effect at the time when they started collecting. I started in the 1950's, and since then there have been a number of changes, and yet I still put all of those former county seats in my county seat collection. Some of them that I can recall at the moment that are no longer county seats are: Evening Shade, AK; Hardy, AK; Powhatan, AK; Wewahitchka, FL; Richfield, KS; Princess Anne, VA; and Grantsburg, WI. It's interesting to go to these former county seats and hear the people talk about the political squabbles and fights that took place which brought about the change in the county seat. Several recent changes have been done because the new county seat is more centrally located in that county than the former county seat was. A good example of that is Grantsburg, Wisconsin, which had the county seat moved to Siren, Wisconsin, because the town is centrally located in the middle of the county.

There are two interesting books about county seats that you might like to buy that provide a wealth of information. The first one is The American Counties, Third Edition, by Joseph Nathan Kane, The Scarecrow Press, Inc., Metuchen, NJ; and the second is The Directory of the Cities and Counties and County Seats of the United States, The A.C. Publications, POB 206, McPherson, KS 67460. Both are worth having with your collection.

I hope that the above gives you some insight into a most fascinating category that is one of the most challenging that exists. It is certainly exciting and a lot of fun to go off of the interstate highways and visit county seats that are truly fascinating to learn about. You meet people who go out of their way to try and find book matches for you. If you enjoy courthouses the way I do, each and every one is more unique and beautiful than the last one.
