
## A Guide To Gover Sizes

Twenty -strikes and Thirty-strikes are the standards of the industry, but there are

certainly other sizes to be collected!

**Midget** - Lion trademark for its


















small 14-strike covers


(3 3/16"x1 1/8"); highly sought-after; 1934-1943; also a large category for such covers. 8,253 listed as of 7/09.

10-Strike - generic term for covers with 10 matches; manufactured by Ohio, Match Corp, and Universal: introduced b y Universal (with 'Ten-Strike' a s its trademarked name) in 1938. John Williams's collection numbers 8,000+ [see also Ten-Strike1

**12-Strike** - generic term for covers with 12 matches: cover is

1/8"); 24-strike, 30-strike, Perfect 36, 40-strike, and Jewel





slightly wider than 10-strike covers; produced by Arrow Match Co., Advance Match Co., and Maryland Match Co.; unclear as to whether Arrow or Advance introduced the size.

At least 1714 known.

**20-Strike** - generic term for covers with 20 matches or that sized cover; earli-

est and most common size of matchcover; produced by almost all US manufacturers after 1920. [see also specific trademarks such as Eagle 20, etc.]

**Tall** - referring to matchcovers (app. 4 7/8" or slightly longer) that are noticeably longer than modern ones; their successors were shortened to their present length for use in vending ma-

chines just prior to WW II; also called Xtra-Longs (XL).


24-Strike - By Columbia Match Co., trademarked as 'Eagle 24'. 45mm x 110 mm. 1980-1985. Jupiter One-Eights are also this size

30-Strike - generic term for covers with 30 matches or that sized cover; first introduced by Owname in 1935. [see also specific trademarks such as Ambassador, Aristocrat, Lion 30 STICK, etc.]

Perfect 36 - Diamond trademark for its 36-strike covers; larger than 30-strike

size, but smaller than 40-strike size; 1948-c. 1952. 612 listed as of 1/95.

**40-Strike** - generic term for covers with 40 matches or that sized cover; introduced by Advance Match Co. in 1931. Joe Onofri's collection numbered 2000+ as of 10/88. [see also specific trademarks such as Billboard, Royal Flash, etc.]

**Jewel** - Universal trademark for its 5 1/16"x1 7/8" covers (looks like a long 30-strike); 1955-1987; one collector reported 7,880; also a category .

**Classique** - Universal trademark for slightly larger than Jewel-sized covers w/paper matches glued in; only 33 known; introduced 1967.




Giant - Lion manumark for its 11-stick, 9 1/16"x3 3/8" covers; 1936-c. 1993 [most come from the 1940s-1950s]. Mel Garrett's, KS, collection numbered 626 in 6/93.

Souvenir - category for the larger sized covers generally available originally at souvenir stands (100-strike and larger); James Willard, MD, had 186 as of 2/09.

Double Length - mid-1950s Universal trademark for covers which folded out to a double length. 21 currently listed. 20 and 40 sizes (I've never seen a 30-strike)

Poster Feature - Lion trademark for its postcard-width covers (9"x6"); introduced in 1956; Joel Acus, OH, had 28 as of 11/05.


