But auction bidders would be only half the problem. We can't auction what we don't have. We'd have to have good participation from sellers, as well. And, in that vein, *my* suggestion, for this particular event, would be to abandon the usual "10 lots per seller" restriction and put it on a 'first come-first served' basis, until the auction is filled.

As usual, there would have to be volunteers to do all the work, but that's normally never been a problem, thanks to all the good souls who tirelessly offer their services for the good of the club and the good of the hobby.
