## "How Big Is Your Collection?"

May—95 responding —85 males, 10 females75 RMS members—20 non-RMS members

[drum roll...] The average collection size was.... 66,823 covers!

At the top end, there were the 250,000+ collections, going all the up to 1,000,000, but more than balancing those out were the numbers of the new and very specialized collectors. [I should have included a question dealing with how many years the person has been collecting, now that I see the results]

I thought it was interesting that all the bigger collections were from males. The resulting generalization would be true, I think, but perhaps not as ironclad as the results seen here. I remember, for example, when I came into the hobby in the 1980s, and Evelyn Hovious, here in the San Francisco area, literally had millions of covers.

The larger collections were all from RMS members, and, as you can see here, the bulk of the non-RMS members reported substantially less than 30,000 covers. Not surprising, since I assume that *most* collectors who are going to be veterans and really serious collectors end up as RMS members, simply because that's the national organization, and the biggest, and the one with more to offer collectors. Many of the smaller collectors, on the other hand, tend to be local people who, for various reasons, either aren't interested or aren't able to pursue the hobby with as much time and vigor as other collectors...but there's certainly nothing wrong with the latter. We all tailor our collecting to meet our own particular personal needs and goals. And, of course, some of the smaller numbers were from collectors who simply haven't been collecting for any substantial time.

Also, the average here may well have increased since earlier polls, since many of the smaller collectors have disappeared from the hobby over the last decade or so.

Are these figures really indicative of the whole? I can't say for certain, but I would think they're at least in the ball park...unless, for example, there's some sort of odd correlation between, say, large collections and collectors who have e-mail! Because, keep in mind with all these polls that I'm running...I'm only polling those collectors I can reach via e-mail.
