

## Collecting Disney Art!

When you think of Disney and matchcovers, one tends to think of covers from the amusement parks: Disneyland, Disney World, EuroDisney, etc. But when we're talking about covers sporting actual Disney art, you might be surprised to learn that there's more of such art to be found in the Military category than any other.





In 1940, construction was completed on Disney's Burbank studio. The staff swelled to more than 1,000 artists, animators, story men and technicians. And luckily so, for during World War II, 94 percent of the Disney facilities were engaged in special government work, including the production of training and propaganda films for the armed services, health films which are still shown throughout the world by the U.S. State Department—and the creation of logos for various military units. The remainder of his efforts were devoted to the production of

comedy short subjects, deemed highly essential to civilian and military morale.

There are some very nice Disney sets of art work available in the Military area. The most famous, of course, is the Disney-Pepsi set, 48 20-strikes from D.D. Bean, issued during World War II. Each cover is numbered, as shown here, and each features a unique Disney drawing

Indeed, almost all of the covers here come from the World War II period. Maryland Match Company, as a further example, came out with a set of 20 20-strikes in 1942 (and I believe there were one or two variation sets). The set was done for the National Match Company. I don't have the entire set, but the ones I do have all seem to have a yellow background. If anyone does have the entire Maryland set, <u>I would certainly appreciate getting a listing, similar to the one shown here</u>, so I can run it in a future issue...and I'd also like to have it, myself!

Aside from these wonderful sets, there are also a number (at least) of singles, some of which are pictured on page one, including, note, a 40-strike. I don't seem to have any examples in a 30-strike size.

I didn't specifically go through my Navy Ships for further examples, but I do know that there are some—the Post-War U.S.S. Dionysus (AR-21) cover, for one.

Plus, there are additional Disney art covers to be seen among Military collections which are not specifically labeled "Walt Disney," Disney," Disney Productions," etc. For example, covers from the Anacostia (DC) Naval Reserve Aviation Base and Jacksonville (FL) Naval Air Station sport Donald Duck drawings.

All in all, we're probably looking at 100+ covers in this area—a nice small category, and yet one offering ample challenges even for the veteran collector. You can bet that Disney collectors outside the hobby scoop up such covers whenever they come across any...and I'd just as soon see those covers stay *inside* the hobby, so you might consider starting on them yourself.
